Dr. Kalam played a significant role in the lives of IISc and its alums. He was closely associated with IISc during his tenure at HAL, ISRO, DRDO etc. and worked with Satish Dhawan, R. Chidambaram and many more.

Dr. Abdul Kalam - Patriot, Missile Man, Humanist, and a Friend of IISc

Dr. A.P.J. Abdul Kalm passed away on July 27, 2015 during a talk he was giving at Indian Institute of Management at Shillong in Assam. He was 84 years old. It was a sad day for many Indians all over the world; everyone felt India had lost a great soul, similar to Mahatma Gandhi. Kalam was a peoples' President, a role model to over a billion Indians including scientists, engineers, students, common men and women. Hundreds of articles have been written in newspapers and magazines in India extolling his character—his treatment of people he came across, how he devoted his life to motivating young Indians' interest in science, and how he conducted himself even when he was in the highest office.

He inaugurated (through a video hook-up) the First IISc Alumni Global Conference held in Santa Clara in July 2007 while he was President of India.

A Great Soul has Passed Away Prof. Satish Nagarajaiah

A great soul has passed away. A great voice for India has fallen silent. His contributions as a visionary and President, Missile Scientist, and a legacy of service will remain etched in the memory of India forever. May his soul rest after 84 years of hard and unflinching work.

When Rice University hosted him in October 2007, I had the opportunity to witness what a day in the life of former President is like (let alone a sitting President!). Grueling is all I can say. When I went to pick him up in the hotel at 8:30 am to bring him to Rice in his official limousine escorted by squad cars, he had been up for four hours already (at 4:30 am!). When I asked him what he did getting up so early, he told me he meditated early in the morning every day and one of the books he read was the revered Bhagavad Gita.

The day was filled with activities including a public lecture by Dr. Kalam for a packed auditorium at Rice University (1200 capacity-plus a live telecast for an overflow of about 400 and a live webcast). The day included a closed session, where a few handpicked group of Rice scientists and engineers presented to Dr. Kalam, including myself on structural damage detection and our work on space shuttle Columbia disaster and structural health monitoring of the International Space Station for NASA. He quipped "can you help us detect damage in turbine blades" for which I responded in the affirmative. The day included a private reception by President David Leebron of Rice University with over 80 distinguished guests from Houston. Dr. Kalam and David Leebron inaugurated the south central chapter of IISc AANA in the presence of Arkal Shenoy, myself, and other alums from Houston. When I dropped him back at his hotel room in St. Regis in Houston at 10 pm, he was ready to talk for some more time. But I was dog tired and I wondered how does a man of 77 years do this day-in-and-day-out, when I was so tired? The answer lies in sheer determination to reach out to one and all and spread his vision for India...

He passed away while doing what he enjoyed the most speaking about his vision for the country...just like my father Sri. N. M. Nagarajaiah passed away while doing what he enjoyed the most...in service of his fellowmen...

I had the pleasure of interacting with him personally, while hosting him at Rice, in October 2007 and then again in 2011. See a few photos at the following websites:

IISc Alumni Global Conference - 2015

The third IISc alumni global conference was held in the J.N. Tata Auditorium on IISc campus in Bangalore on June 26-28, 2015. Over 900 delegates (including over 30 delegates from the U.S.) attended the conference.

The conference started off with a ceremony honoring Professor C.N.R. Rao, who received the 'Bharat Ratna' award from Government of India. In one of the sessions on the first day, several alumni heading major scientific institutions in India such as ISRO, DRDO, NIAS, and LCA Flight Program spoke at the conference. Sessions included

- Contribution of IISc to Strategic Sectors
- IISc as a Global Institution -- Reaching the Top
- Mind to Market
- Brain Research
- Nano Science and Engineering
- High Performance Computing & Big Data Analysis.

IISc Director announced the formation of the Office of Development and Alumni Affairs (ODAA). This office now has a fully functional website which includes all the IISc graduates (over 24, 000) since its inception. All alums can register on the website and avail of various facilities: http://alumni.iisc.ernet.in

A separate interactive student session was held during the conference in Faculty Hall where students could interact with alums. Over 100 students participated with a panel of alums from academia, industry, research labs, and tech business enterprises.

AANA president Dr. Arkal Shenoy presented a check for \$16, 000 to ODAA Chair Prof. Rangarajan as AANA's contribution. AANA has invited both the Director and ODAA Chair to visit the US and address IISc alums in various major cities. The Director has accepted the invitation and he will visit Chicago and Silicon Valley during October 8-13, 2015.

Highlighting IISc AANA Members -Dr. Arkal Shenoy (1966)

Dr. Arkal Shenoy (1966), a nuclear engineer and scientist, has been the Chair of AANA since October 2012. After completing a Ph.D. in Nuclear Engineering at Georgia Tech, he worked for 42 years at General Atomics in San Diego and retired as Director of Gas Cooled Nuclear Reactor and other Fission Programs. He consults on nuclear, solar, wind and fossil energy programs. He is a member of Sigma XI, the American Nuclear Society, and the American Society of Mechanical Engineers. He is interested in music and dance and is on the Board of Center for World Music (CWM) and related Arts in San Diego.

He lives with his wife Dr. Vasanthi Shenoy in Del Mar, California. Vasanthi, a sociology professor taught at San Diego State and San Marcos State Universities for more than 30 years and also taught Bharatanatyam, a classical Indian dance, to several students in San Diego area. They have two sons Dinesh currently living in the Bay area and Rajesh in Toronto. Both Arkal and Vasanthi are retired and are involved in several nonprofit organizations in the US and India.

GB: Please tell me about your career after IISc?

AS: After completing my masters in Mechanical Engineering at IISc, I attended Georgia Institute of Technology in Atlanta during 1966-1969. After completing my Ph. D. in Nuclear Engineering, I started working as a nuclear engineer with General Atomics in San Diego. I retired from GA in 2012.

GB: How did you get interested in AANA?

Every time I used to visit Bangalore, I visited the Institute and met people in the Mechanical Engineering department and the IISc Alumni Association. In March 1996 when the foundation stone was laid for the current Alumni Building at the Institute, Dr. Narain Mahishi, Hon. Gen. Secretary of IISc AA contacted us and requested that we get the Alumni in San Diego to support the building. Because of the support from San Diego, one of the rooms in the building was named "California". My main involvement with AANA occurred at the First Global Conference in June 2007 at Silicon Valley. Subsequently in December 2008, I attended the IISc Centenary Celebrations and got motivated to work with AANA. Following the First Global conference in the US and the Centenary Celebration in India, we organized the IISc AANA National Conference at the University of California San Diego. More than 100 alumni from both northern and southern California met to further expand AANA in North America.

During this time I kept constant touch with the founders of AANA and was requested in 2012 to be chair of the AANA Board for a three year term ending September 2015.

GB: What would you like to see AANA grow into in the next five years?

AS: Consistent with AANA Mission "To Give Back", I would like to see AANA work to help the alumni in social and professional networking, job opportunities, entrepreneurship, and business development. Also we can help the communities we live in and rural India towards education and public outreach. Above all, we can support to our alma mater, Indian Institute of Science, by working closely with the Office of Development and Alumni Affairs (ODAA) which was recently established by Director Anurag Kumar. Also, I would like to see AANA help alumni in other parts of the world including Europe, Australia, and Japan to work closely with ODAA.

GB: Do you have any India-based activity now or plan to have in the future?

AS: In India, the Shenoy family has established Arkula Charitable Trust (ACT) to carry out charitable activities initially in our village (Arkula) and to extend the coverage to neighboring villages in a phased manner. ACT has organized programs for education of children, health awareness, quality of life, poverty alleviation, agriculture and farming extension, women empowerment, and rural development. India is poised to become the world's youngest country by 2020, with an average age of 29 years, and will account for around 28% of the world's workforce. In comparison, during the same period, the average age is expected to be 37 years in China and the US and 45 years in Western Europe. This requires development of skills for 500 million Indians in the next ten years. I am interested in working with AANA and IISc including the IISc student body to help in educating the younger population to develop a variety of skills in villages like Arkula and spread this effort to other rural areas in India.

Last Day with Kalam by Sirjan Paul Singh

What I will be remembered for: My memory of the last day with the great Kalam sir.

It has been eight hours since we last talked - sleep eludes me and memories keep flushing down, sometimes as tears. Our day, 27th July, began at 12 noon, when we took our seats in the flight to Guwahati. Dr. Kalam was 1A and I was IC. He was wearing a dark colored 'Kalam suit', and I started off complimenting, 'Nice color! 'Little did I know this was going to be the last color I will see on him.

The 2.5 hours of flight was followed by another 2.5 hours of car drive to IIM Shillong. For these two legged trip of five hours we talked, discussed and debated. As each of them, this was as special too. Three incidents/discussions in particular will be lasting memories of our last trip. First, Dr. Kalam was absolutely worried about the attacks in Punjab. The loss of innocent lives left him filled with sorrow. The topic of lecture at IIM Shillong was 'Creating a Livable Planet Earth.' He related the incident to the topic and said, "It seems the man-made forces are as big a threat to the livability of earth as pollution". We discussed on how, if this trend of violence, pollution and reckless human action continues we will forced to leave earth. "Thirty years, at this rate, maybe," he said. "You guys must do something about it, it is going to be your future world."

Our second discussion was more national. For the past two days, Dr. Kalam was worried that time and again Parliament, the supreme institution of democracy, was dysfunctional. He said, "I have seen two different governments in my tenure. I have seen more after that. This disruption just keeps happening. It is not right. I really need to find out a way to ensure that the parliament works on developmental politics." He then asked me to prepare a surprise assignment question for the students at IIM Shillong, which he would give them only at the end of the lecture. He wanted to them to suggest three innovative ways to make the Parliament more productive and vibrant. Then, after a while he returned on it. "But how can ask them to give solutions if I don't have any myself." We wanted to include this discussion in our upcoming book, *Advantage India*.

Third, was an experience from the beauty of his humility. We were in a convoy of 6-7 cars. Dr. Kalam and I were in the second car. Ahead of us was an open gypsy with three soldiers in it. Two of them were sitting on either side and one lean guy was standing atop, holding his gun. One hour into the road journey, Dr. Kalam said, "Why is he standing? He will get tired. This is like punishment. Can you ask a wireless message to be given that he may sit?" I had to convince him, he has been probably instructed to keep standing for better security. He did not relent. We tried radio messaging that did not work. For the next 1.5 hours of the journey, he reminded me thrice to see if I can hand signal him to sit down. Finally, realizing there is little we can do he told me, "I want to meet him and thank him. Later, when we landed in IIM Shillong, I went inquiring through security people and got hold of the standing guy. I took him inside and Dr. Kalam greeted him. He shook his hand, said thank you buddy. "Are you tired? Would you like something to eat? I am sorry you had to stand so long because of me." The young lean guard, draped in black cloth, was surprised at the treatment. He lost words, just said, "Sir, aapkeliye toh 6 ghante bhi khade rahenge (Sir for you I will stand even six hours)."

After this, we went to the lecture hall. He did not want to be late for the lecture. ³Students should never be made to wait², he always said. I quickly set up his mike, briefed on final lecture and took position on the computers. As I pinned his mike, he smiled and said, 3Funny guy! Are you doing well?" I smiled back, "Yes." Those were the last words he said. Two minutes into the speech, sitting behind him, I heard a long pause after completing one sentence. I looked at him, he fell down. We picked him up. As the doctor rushed, we tried whatever we could. I will never forget the look in his three-quarter closed eyes and I held his head with one hand and tried reviving with whatever I could. His hands clenched, curled onto my finger. There was stillness on his face and those wise eyes were motionlessly radiating wisdom. In five minutes we were in the nearest hospital. In another few minutes they indicated the missile man had flown away, forever. I touched his feet, one last time. Adieu old friend! Grand mentor! See you in my thoughts and meet in the next birth. He never said a word. He did not show pain, only purpose was visible.

As turned back, a closet of thoughts opened.

Often he would ask me, "You are young, decide what will like to be remembered for?" I kept thinking of new impressive answers, till one day I gave up and resorted to tit-for-tat. I asked him back, "First you tell me, what will you like to be remembered for? President, Scientist, Writer, Missile man, India 2020, Target 3 billion. What?" I thought I had made the question easier by giving options, but he sprang on me a surprise. "Teacher," he said.

Then something he said two weeks back when we were discussing about his missile time friends. He said, "Children need to take care of their parents. It is sad that sometimes this is not happening." He paused and said, "Two things. Elders must also do. Never leave wealth at your deathbed that leaves a fighting family. Second, one is blessed is one can die working, standing tall without any long drawn ailing. Goodbyes should be short, really short." Today, I look back he took the final journey, teaching, what he always wanted to be remembered doing. And, till his final moment he was standing, working and lecturing. He left us, as a great teacher, standing tall. He leaves the world with nothing accumulated in his account but loads of wishes and love of people. He was a successful, even in his end.

Will miss all the lunches and dinners we had together, will miss all the times you surprised me with your humility and startled me with your curiosity, will miss the lessons of life you taught in action and words, will miss our struggles to race to make into flights, our trips, our long debates. You gave me dreams, you showed me dreams need to be impossible, and for anything else is a compromise to my own ability. The man is gone, the mission lives on. Long live Kalam.

DD Podhigai telecast an interview with Mr P M Nair retired IAS officer who was the secretary to Dr Kalam Sir when he was the President. I summarise the points he spoke in voice choked with emotion. Mr Nair authored a book titled "Kalam Effect."

1. Dr Kalam used to receive costly gifts whenever he went as it is customary for many nations to give gifts to the visiting Head of state. Refusing the gift would become an insult to the nation and an embarrassment for India. So, he received them and on his return, Dr Kalam asked the gifts to be photographed and then catalogued and handed over to the archives. Afterwards, he never even looked at them. He did not take even a pencil from the gifts received when he left Rashtrapathi Bhavan.

2. In 2002, the year Dr Kalam took over, the Ramadan month came in July-August. It was a regular practice for the President to host an Iftar party. Dr Kalam asked Mr Nair why he should host a party to people who are already well fed and asked him to find out how much would be the cost. Mr Nair told it costs around Rs. 22 lakhs. Dr Kalam asked him to donate that amount to a few selected orphanages in the form of food, dresses and blankets. The selection of orphanages was left to a team in Rashtrapathi Bhavan and Dr Kalam had no role in it. After the selection was made, Dr Kalam asked Mr Nair to come inside his room and gave him a cheque for Rs 1 lakh. He said that he is giving some amount from his personal savings and this should not be informed to anyone. Mr Nair was so shocked that he said "sir, I will go outside and tell everyone. People should know that here is a man who not only donated what he should have spent but he is giving his own money also". Dr Kalam though he was a devout Muslim did not have Iftar parties in the years in which he was the President.

3. Dr Kalam did not like "yes sir" type of people. Once when the Chief Justice of India had come and on some point Dr Kalam expressed his view and asked Mr Nair, "Do you agree?"/ Mr Nair said "No sir, I do not agree with you". The Chief Justice was shocked and could not believe his ears. It was impossible for a civil servant to disagree with the president and that too so openly. Mr Nair told him that the President would question him afterwards why he disagreed and if the reason was logical 99% he would change his mind.

4. Dr Kalam invited 50 of his relatives to come to Delhi and they all stayed in Rashtrapathi Bhavan. He organised a bus for them to go around the city which was paid for by him. No official car was used. All their stay and food was calculated as per the instructions of Dr Kalam and the bill came to Rs 2 lakhs which he paid. In the history of this country no one has done it. Now, wait for the climax, Dr Kalam's elder brother stayed with him in his room for the entire one week as Dr Kalam wanted his brother to stay with him. When they left, Dr Kalam wanted to pay rent for that room also. Imagine a President of country paying rent for the room in which he is staying. This was any way not agreed by the staff who thought the honesty was getting too much to handle!!

5. When Kalam sir was to leave Rashtrapathi Bhavan at the end of the tenure, every staff member went and met him and paid their respects. Mr Nair went to him alone as his wife had fractured her leg and was bed ridden. Dr Kalam asked why his wife did not come. He

replied that she was in bed due to an accident. Next day, Nair saw lot of police men around his house and asked what had happened. They said that the President of India was coming to visit him in his house. He came and met his wife and chatted for some time. Mr Nair says that no president of any country would visit a civil servant's house and that too on such a simple pretext.

I thought I should give the details as many of you may not have seen the telecast and so it may be useful.

Scientists Adopt Institutions In India To Help Poor Students Get Better Education

everal alumni of IISc, who left India to achieve success abroad, are now helping poor students in the country Nurture the School that Nurtured You (NSNY), a programmes started by the IISc Alumni Association of North America (AANA), has adopted 15 schools in different parts of the country and is working towards making learning a better prospect.

Prof Arkal Shenoy nuclear scientist and president of IISc AANA, was among the first to sponsor a programme in a government school in Ujire about a month ago.

Nasa scientist of Mars Curiosity fame, Dr Gajanana Birur had adopted schools near his home town Birur in Chikmaglur district 10 years ago,

Two weeks ago, he set up a robotics lab at an education centre run by social activists in Chettanahalli, a small village between Birur and Tarikere. "I have now realized that robotics helps imbibe a spirit of curiosity and I have seen it work through the work of another alumni, who is working with a school in Bengaluru," he said.

He has also adopted a government school in Bovipalya near Rajajinagar in Bengaluru. "It has only 45 students as the area now has developed from when I saw it decades ago and parents prefer private English schools. I want this school to become a symbol of desire. I want these students to learn what they want in a manner that is practiced globally." he said.

P Sridhar, another alumni who quit a well-paying engineering job in Pune to take up a project with Akshara Foundation in teaching young school children, has in some sense been the driver of robotics in education.

Sushanth Kumar Prasad, a PhD scholar at IISc and a volunteer for these teaching programmes, says: "The kind of work that is happening here is really inspiring and keeps reminding us that we must all contribute to the society."

Another student Sreeparna Biswas, who had travelled with Gajanana to help set up the lab in Chettanahalli, says: "It is not that they have little capabilities, the problem is that they have limited or no opportunities."
